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Remembrance Sunday - 12 November 2023



Councillor Ed Willmot laid a Poppy Wreath on the War Memorial on behalf of the Parish Council and Ashover Parish following an emotional and heartfelt service in All Saints Church led by the Reverend Dr Peter Bold when the Choir sang and Ashover Brass Band played.

Ashover Parish Council displayed poppies around the parish to mark the Remembrance.



At the centenary marking the end of WW1, Ashover Tree Group was encouraged by the Parish Council to come up with a fitting tribute to commemorate those who lost their lives in the 1914 – 1918 war.

In response, the tree group planted 3 beech trees in separate locations overlooking the village. This 'Centenary Triangle' of trees is located in Milltown (Holestone), Uppertown (Wirestone Lane) and just outside the Fabric boundary. The tree near the Fabric is clearly flourishing, as our recent picture shows.'

Thanks to our wonderful volunteers, each and every child got to spend time with Father Christmas in the beautiful, and incredibly atmospheric grotto, and told him what they wanted to open on Christmas morning.

River Amber

In our last Quarterly Newsletter, we gave an update on the Environment Agency's (EA's) initial water sampling results and described how we now have additional points of contact in Severn Trent.

In the latest update from EA they have said arising from their recent test results they will be visiting agricultural premises in this financial year. In our reply, we observed that presumably this would include focus on Uppertown as the most recent sonde sampling had been positioned upstream of Kelstedge. With this in mind, we asked they take into account that the Uppertown community are reliant on septic tank installations which clearly may have a potential impact on local water quality in the Amber. Dependent on the sampling results we've suggested they flag any issues with Severn Trent so the potential need for an upgrade of the community's infrastructure is reflected in Severn Trent's investment decisions. These investment options won't be debated until the New Year and we'll share further updates as we get them.

Climate Change Working Group - update

In recent years there has been increasing focus on Climate issues and in mid-2020, with encouragement from Ashover Parish Council, a Climate Change working group was formed. This group, chaired by Lucy Hunter-Bott, now has 11 members and the main focus has been on:

- Building efficiency, Utilities, Waste
- Outdoor things & biodiversity

On building related matters there was limited scope to influence change as the Parish Council's direct control is limited to the public toilets. Nevertheless, we're now collaborating with the Parish Hall and the Bassett Rooms to share knowledge and explore scope for climate friendly changes.

In January 2024 the provisions of the Environment Acts 2021/2023 came into force. Briefly, the aim is to "restore nature and improve the environmental quality of the air, our waters and our land". It's good that The Climate Change Group's existing workstreams on 'Outdoor things' align with the new Acts and the group benefits from an existing dialogue with Derbyshire Wildlife Trust (DWT) for advice and coaching and with NEDDC who have recently recruited specialists to manage their obligations under the new act.

Specific, local initiatives by the group include:

- ❖ A wildlife corridor where members of the group are planning on-site meetings with landowners and develop ideas for wildlife/fauna enhancement.
- Engagement with the school to explore potential for projects and how the group might help with planning and funding
- Parish Common Land Identify re-wilding potential in partnership with DWT.
- 'Living roofs' explore the feasibility and cost of fitting them to our bus shelters.

So, lots to do and we'll provide progress updates in the coming months!

Winter Maintenance Guidance

Your Parish Council owns and fills a total of 37 grit bins sited around the parish and undertakes winter maintenance of the Milken Lane Car Park. The salt is supplied for use on the highway adjacent the bin and if you witness large amounts being taken for personal use, please contact the Police.

Defibrillators

Defibrillators – saving life.

A defibrillator is a device that gives a jolt of energy to the heart. It helps get the heart beating again when someone is in cardiac arrest and their heart has stopped.

Locations of defibrillators

Ashover Parish Council has installed six defibrillators at the following locations:-



Outside Uppertown Social Centre
Outside the medical centre in Ashover
In the red kiosk at Alton In the red kiosk at Littlemoor
On the side of The Miners Arms, Milltown
On the side of The Kelstedge Inn, Kelstedge

There's also a defibrillator sited at the Red Lion/Peak Edge Hotel, Darley Road, Stonedge.

Business owners

Business owners who have a defibrillator are encouraged to register their unit with 'The Circuit', the national defibrillator network, such that the location of units available may be identified to the East Midlands Ambulance Service in an emergency. How to use a defibrillator

If in an emergency you need to use one of the defibrillators then dial 999 and you will be given the code to the cabinet and further instructions.

Anyone can use a defibrillator. You do not need training. Once you turn it on, it will give clear step-by-step voice instructions.

Derbyshire County Council News

Savings proposals announced

We've announced a number of proposals which, if agreed, could save the council millions of pounds and support the setting of a balanced budget.



In common with authorities across the country, we are facing budgetary pressures far greater than experienced before, due to factors beyond our control. These include dealing with higher than anticipated inflation and higher prices for fuel, energy and materials, meeting the cost of the national pay award set nationally but met locally, and the continued unprecedented increase in demand for vital adults' and children's social care services.

As well as a current forecast overspend for 2023-24 of £33m, there's a predicted shortfall of £39.5m in our budget for the year ahead (2024-25) which has resulted in the savings proposals being put forward.

The announcement earlier this week and accompanying report which will be considered by our Cabinet on 11 January, sets out how we intend to make savings and set a balanced budget for 2024-25. The report includes proposals that will be subject to our Scrutiny process, and the proposals will be considered by the Improvement and Scrutiny Committee – Resources, later this month (22 Jan 2024) before being considered further by Cabinet. Announcing the report, County Council Leader Councillor Barry Lewis and Deputy Leader Councillor Simon Spencer said they had been left with no choice but to put forward the raft

Councillor Simon Spencer said they had been left with no choice but to put forward the raft of multi-million-pound savings proposals which, if agreed, would affect many services used by thousands of Derbyshire residents.

All the proposals will be subject to close scrutiny and no decisions have yet been made. Any proposal which could potentially affect residents will be subject to public engagement and or full public consultation where appropriate.


Next steps for County Hall

We're considering redeveloping our headquarters at County Hall in Matlock.

After successfully engaging with developers and hotel operators, and working with specialist architects HLM Architects and Real estate works over the past year, a preferred option for the whole County Hall complex has been developed, which includes:

- turning the south block of County Hall and the Winter Gardens into a hotel and events venue
- creating new homes in the north block and the south west car park
- building a new, low carbon office on the site to accommodate up to 500 council employees.

During the summer of 2023 expressions of interest were sought from developers, hotel operators and others for their ideas on options for the future of the historic complex of buildings, and the information gained has been used to



Our overriding objective is to deliver the best outcome for the long-term use of the complex so that it contributes to the vitality of the town of Matlock and makes a significant ongoing contribution to the economy of the area.

If the proposals are approved work will continue over the coming months and years to develop the project.
